Introduction

Summary of Sessions 1-3: Jesus came for rebels. He came to die for rebels like us all so that we would repent and turn to God. Because of Jesus' resurrection from the grave, the time for repentance is now, but time is running out because God has fixed a day when Jesus will judge the world in righteousness. The lost can join the party of the Father's embrace now by repenting and trusting in Jesus alone to forgive their sins.

Read

"Pilate summoned the chief priests and the rulers and the people, and said to them, "You brought this man to me as one who incites the people to rebellion, and behold, having examined Him before you, I have found no guilt in this man regarding the charges which you make against Him." -*Luke 23:13-14 (NASU)*

The passage in Luke 23 brings us to another irony in the charges against Jesus at the cross. The religious leaders charged that Jesus was a revolutionary, an insurrectionist. They claimed that his life was a danger to the society. This is another irony that Luke develops from the cross in his second volume, the book of Acts. The lie they created to put a stop to his influence actually unleashed his influence into all the world after the resurrection. Things got out of control. A real rebellion broke out that couldn't be contained. Acts narrates the story of the ruckus that erupted in Jerusalem because of the news that Jesus had been resurrected.

Miracles began to happen. People were trying to figure out what was happening. Peter stands and explains it all to them. Luke records what happened in Acts 2. Read Acts 2:37-41.

Discuss

Q. What is the appropriate response to the resurrection of Jesus from the grave? What should you do in light of the resurrection?

"Repent and be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins." -Acts 2:38a

"Repent therefore, and turn again, that your sins may be blotted out, that times of refreshing may come from the presence of the Lord." - Acts 3:19-20

_____ : Turn from sin and trust in Jesus alone to save. As in Luke, the Father is welcoming sinners who repent of their sins and come to him through Jesus. This was the message of the early followers of Jesus as they continued proclaiming the message of Jesus.

The early followers of Jesus urged people to repent because of the resurrection.

_____ in the name of Jesus Christ: openly identifying with Christ's death, burial, and resurrection.

This commitment could not be confined to a personal decision or a personal faith. This was a public decision that demanded a public response. Baptism is following Jesus example as he was baptized (Luke 3:21-22) and owning up to your new identity in him. It's the first outward step of non-conformity. It's aligning your life with Jesus' death as you go down into the water and resurrection as you come up out of the water.

Acts tells the story of how nothing could hinder the progress of this new community. Jesus' followers upset the world order by living counter-culturally, by refusing to conform to the pattern of life around them.

There are two paths before you: which way will you go?

Option 1: The Path of _____:

These rebels:

- Run from God and his restraints like the younger son.
- Trust in themselves and their works to make them right with Him like the older son.
- Their lives are aligned with the crooked generation. They either give themselves to godlessness or self-righteous religion.
- This life will not end well. It will be ultimately unsatisfying because they will miss the party of the Father's love in Jesus Christ. They miss the party now in the church and miss the party at the judgment in the end. This is a dead-end that will end in God's judgment.

Option 2: The Path of _____:

Following Jesus individually and as his new community

These rebels:

- Run to God through Jesus for forgiveness of their sins.
- Stop trusting in themselves and in their works to save, but trust in Jesus alone to forgive them of their sins.
- Enjoy the love of the Father in Jesus and experience life both now and forever. They have no fear of the judgment to come because their sins are forgiven now and forever.
- They live distinct lives in the midst of a crooked generation.
- They repent of their sins continually. The church is not for the self-righteous, but for those who confess their lack of righteousness. The church is a hospital for the sick who are being restored by Jesus (Luke 5:27-32).
- They publically identify with Jesus Christ and his church in baptism.
- They embody the counter-cultural lifestyle of Jesus. They rebel as they live in righteousness and faithfulness to God.
- The reality of the resurrection compels them to tell everyone the good news.
- They continually meet as the church to devote themselves to learning from the Bible and prayer.
